

1.1 Introduction

The end stage of life is a sensitive and symbolic time for patients and their loved ones. Understanding the perspective and experience of the patient and their loved ones is vital to provide culturally safe and appropriate, evidence-based palliative care. This document aims to provide insight into appropriate cultural knowledge and practices and identify education and clinical tools that will assist Metro North Health (Metro North) staff in providing culturally and clinically responsive care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander patients and their families. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture encompasses many customary practices and protocols to ensure the safe passage of the Spirit into the afterlife and to prevent the Spirit from returning. These practices have meanings that are sacred to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and disclosing them is not the intentions of these guidelines. Queensland Health recognises the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to practice cultural and spiritual traditions and customs without discrimination or judgement.

This document summarises resources and internal and external learning and development opportunities for Metro North staff working within and across Palliative Care services. There may be additional training available at your workplace and you are encouraged to liaise with your local Cultural Capability Officer (CCO), Indigenous Health Liaison Officer (IHLO), IPEPA (Indigenous Program of Experience in the Palliative Approach) Queensland, professional education unit (medical and nursing workforce) or Workforce Development Officer (Allied Health). Similarly, the Metro North Health Equity page provides up to date information including vidcasts, Qld Health Equity resources and frequently asked questions.





1.4 Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD)

<u>Metro North Policy 007272 – Voluntary Assisted Dying</u> outlines the principles relating to VAD, and the restrictions in place pertaining to how the VAD process is communicated by clinicians and healthcare workers.

Under both the Act and the Criminal Code Act 1995 (Cth) (Commonwealth Criminal Code), there are restrictions related to communication about VAD.

These include:

- who can initiate a discussion relating to VAD with a person (the Act)
- how certain components of the voluntary assisted dying process can be communicated (Commonwealth Criminal Code).

Significant Day	Background	Date
Anniversary of National Apology Day	On 13 February 2008, Prime Minister Kevin Rudd delivered the National Apology to Australia's Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples for the injustices of past government policies, particularly to the Stolen Generations.	13 February 2023
National Close the Gap Day	National Close the Gap Day is an annual event that raises awareness and seeks to close the gap with respect to life expectancy, child mortality, educational and employment outcomes between Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and non-Indigenous Australians.	16 March 2023
National Sorry Day	National Sorry Day provides an opportunity for people to come together and share the journey towards healing for the Stolen Generations, their families and communities.	26 May 2023
1967 Referendum	The 1967 Referendum was a landmark achievement following decades of activism by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous people, where more than 90 percent of Australians voted in favour of amending two sections of the Australian Constitution.	27 May 2023
Reconciliation Week	National Reconciliation Week celebrations commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey-the anniversaries of the successful 1967 Referendum and the High Court Mabo Decision.	27 May – 3 June 2023
Mabo Day	On 3 June 1992, the High Court of Australia overturned the principle of "terra nullius" or "nobody's land" as claimed by the British when they first arrived in this country. The decision has paved the way for Native Title legislation.	3 June 2023
Coming of the Light	The Coming of the Light is celebrated annually by Torres Strait Islander peoples. It marks the adoption of Christianity through island communities during the late nineteenth century.	1 July 2023
